Character & Motivation:

1. Why does Casper choose to help others even though she is lost herself?
2. What fears does Casper face in this story? How does she handle them?
3. Which character changes the most during the story? How?

Empathy & Perspective-Taking:

4. How do the animals treat one another?
5. Can you describe a moment when a character needed understanding rather than strength?
6. How would the story change if the characters refused to cooperate?

Courage & Problem-Solving:

7. What does courage look like in this story?
8. What was the biggest problem in the book? How was it solved?
9. Would you have solved it differently?

Critical Thinking:

10. What part of the story felt most realistic? What felt imaginative?
11. Why is asking questions sometimes more powerful than being the strongest?
12. What lessons from the story apply to real life?

Wildlife Learning Extensions

Each Casper title includes nonfiction fact pages at the back of the book. These pages allow teachers to bridge fiction and informational text.

Suggested Activities:

- Fact vs. Fiction Chart
- Habitat Mapping Activity
- Research Mini-Project on Featured Animal
- Conservation Discussion: Human impact on wildlife

Classroom & Library Integration Ideas

In the Library:

- Feature in an 'Animal Adventure' display
- Pair with nonfiction wildlife texts
- Include in reading challenges

In the Classroom:

- Read-aloud with guided discussion
- Literature circles focusing on character traits
- Creative writing: Alternate ending
- Geography extension: Map Casper's journey
